October 28th, a sunny, unseasonably warm and beautifully cloudless October Saturday, found CCDC Volunteers and members of the Regional EMS Office,

Health Department, and Department of Emergency Services Special Operations and Emergency Management Teams hard at work pretending to evacuate a fictional Long Term Care Facility. Over the course of two sessions, attendees were introduced to Tool Kits specifically designed to track and move residents of Long-Term Care Facilities during urgent unplanned evacuations.



Delaware County Regional EMS Office Direc-

tor, Pat O'Connell provided an introduction and education on the kits in the morning and overviews of real-world evacuations that have occurred in the past in Delaware County, as well as Best Practices and Lessons Learned. In the afternoon session, attendees were introduced to a fictional facility in need of urgent evacuation, and the 50 long-term care residents who they would be serving.

Attendees were assigned realistic roles and tasks, and directed to tables representing either the Facility, Emergency Operations Center, or the Reception/ Shelter Location. This exercise provided valuable information on implementation of the new kits, and solidified the invaluable role that volunteer play in assuring that the community is served during critical events. This exercise will be repeated and additional opportunities will be provided throughout the New Year!

The son of a World War II veteran and a Pennsylvania farm girl, he was raised with a sense of humor, a commitment to service and a natural love of all that life has to offer. From an early age Ed knew he would be a police officer. For more than 30 years he served various communities across Philadelphia, earned the rank of lieutenant, and trained the next generation of officers who are protecting our city today.

A police officer by day, at night he was a rock star who played bass guitar and sang in well-known cover bands. After being noticed by former Philadelphia Mayor Ed Rendell, his band was invited to open the Philadelphia Convention Center. When he wasn't performing you could find him singing karaoke and dancing with friends and family. You might also find him at one of the many social clubs or service organizations he joined over the years.

He was a master storyteller, a friend to all and someone who always remembers your name. Ed loves talking about genealogy, rare coins, and the latest nonfiction book he has his nose buried in.

But of all the things in his life – he loved his family the most. He was proud of the men his sons became. He took joy in watching his grandchildren grow and revels in being a Pop-Pop. And he treasured exploring and living life to its fullest with his wife Debby."

It is safe to say that we are all grateful for knowing Ed, serving with him through the pandemic, and will miss him in training classes and at missions. Gone too soon, we will not get to chat with him about the things we now know interested him and musical talents we could have enjoyed together.

<u>Book Review:</u> "Code Breaker: Jennifer Doudna, Gene Editing, and the Future of the Human Race" By Walter Isaacson (Review by Judy McKinney)

CCDC members have two things in common: volunteering and the experience of living through the Coronavirus Pandemic of 2020. This book provides the backstories of the people, countries and research going on years before Covid-19 came into our lives, and the work done by competing academics and rival university labs culminated with the unprecedented collaboration of their achievements based on their innate scientific curiosity.

The story centers around Jennifer Doudna and her navigation of a career in science and the mentors, rivals, coworkers that influenced and inspired her to continue to create innovative and groundbreaking scientific discoveries. It is an interesting journey providing a window into the academic competitiveness, patents, and races to be the first to publish a new solution to be the top in their field. It demonstrates the importance of interdisciplinary cooperation to make those breakthroughs and conscience due diligence of long lasting solutions. Reading this book gives us another thing in common: a detailed understanding of the science and technology that provided the testing tools and vaccinations we used to help our neighbors get through the pandemic.

Citizen Corps of Delaware County is grateful to have Chief Marchisello as the instructor for the Hazmat Awareness seminar.




ARES Has A Busy Year Planned for 2024

- Included in backup emergency communication plans, EOC exercises on a regular basis.
- This includes close cooperation with the county's Citizen Corps and Medical Reserve Corps groups.


NOAA NATIONAL WEATHER SERVICE

- Secondary served agency is the NOAA National Weather Service.
- NOAA issues a severe weather alert.
- Reportable weather events are automatically emailed over to the Mt. Holly, NI FWS for collection and reporting.

AMERICAN RED CROSS

- · Secondary served agency is the American Red Cross.
- We run SKYWARN nets whenever Can support them if needed during shelter operations.

They are also going to start working on a AREDN network for Delaware County, having purchased 3 WiFi nodes to start a WiFi mesh network for emergency communications. The Volunteer Heart By Beatrice Agar



I am a new member of the CCDC, and will be helping out the F.A.S.T. Team by providing education (with the assistance of my Colleague, Doreen who is an ASL Interpreter). We will be sharing strategies to assist the volunteers in communicating with Deaf individuals during an emergency situation. The following story highlights my journey that led me to volunteer in this capacity.

My background is in healthcare and in education. I am a Registered Dietitian/ Nutritionist (RDN, LDN) and a Certified Medical Assistant. As an RDN, LDN, I have worked in hospitals, long-term care, management, education, and currently as a Dietitian/ Manager. As a Medical Assistant I taught Medical Assisting Students in the classroom and in the Simulation Lab.

My first encounter with Deaf Individuals took place about 8 years ago when I worked at Delaware County Community College. As Coordinator of the Nurse Aide Training and Evaluation Program, I was involved in helping a cohort of Deaf students who worked as Personal Care Associates at an Assisted Living/PACE program for elderly Deaf people. I was running an informational meeting for these students, and I was waiting in the conference room for the students and ASL interpreter to arrive. Two students arrived early and entered the conference room. The interpreter had not yet arrived. The students sat down, and I began to feel a bit awkward, since I had never interacted with Deaf people before.

I started writing notes to them, they wrote back, and we immediately established a rapport. Looking back on it, this choice made all the difference, and started my journey. The interpreter (who by the way was Doreen) and I worked very closely together over the next few months, and I truly enjoyed learning from Doreen and working with these students! The students successfully completed the program, internship, and passed the test to become Nurse Aides.

A couple years later, I ended up working with these Deaf individuals as part of the health care team caring for the Deaf Elderly residents in the Assisted Living facility where I have been the Dietitian/Manager for 6 years! When I started I knew no sign language. I immediately felt the need to learn ASL and the importance of communicating with them in their heart language. I studied ASL at home using borrowed ASL flash cards and studied an old ASL text book from my Granddaughter and ASL class videos online. I immediately learned as many food, kitchen, and healthcare signs as I could. Then a wonderful thing happened. Everyone saw that my heart was in this, and the Deaf Staff, the elderly residents, and interpreters began teaching me. Also, I was very quickly accepted by the Deaf, which also helped my passion to grow.

As my ASL improved, and conversations became easier, I became aware of some unfortunate ways that Deaf people are at times marginalized regarding access to healthcare and other services. I feel my heart's purpose is to advocate for Deaf individuals, to increase awareness of the hardships that Deaf people face, and to assist hearing people and Deaf people to better communicate with each other!
